Facilities Committee Has Been Busy Solving Court & Crosswalk Problems

Your Facilities Committee has been very busy looking at areas that need attention and finding solutions to make your facilities even better. There were two specific locations that the committee addressed and we have received Board approval to proceed.

The first major area was the repair and painting of the court areas for pickleball, tennis and basketball. All the surfaces had developed cracks and places where the surface was uneven. Several companies were researched, and the committee recommended a solution that was approved by the Board at its October 30th meeting. Work will begin within a few weeks after our attorneys approve the contract, and then the project will take four to five weeks to complete. This project will provide a better playing surface in all areas for years to come.

The second project your Facilities Committee took on was to better identify our intersections to ensure the safety of our pedestrians. Multiple companies presented proposals to repaint the crossing areas and the stop bars. Your committee made a recommendation that was approved by the Board at its October 30th meeting to move forward.

Our committee is always looking to add persons that are interested in making our facilities great. If you have a background in committee work and history of improving facilities, please send your request to be considered by the committee to Ingrid Sarmiento, our Property Manager. Construction Of Tradition's Heart Is Progressing!

Tradition's HEART is finally here! Massive metal pieces that make up the world's largest heart-shaped sculpture fabricated by Filipino-American artist JE-FRE have been transported to Tradition where the artist himself is leading the careful assembly and installation, which is now making steady progress.

The 7 million dollar, 73-foot tall stainless steel sculpture was completely funded by Mattamy Homes, the developer of Tradition, at no cost to taxpayers. The Heart is intended to become an iconic gathering spot, boost the local economy and solidify Tradition's identity as the "heart" of the Treasure Coast.

The "Heart in the Park" sits on a circular pedestal in a raised plaza at the intersection of Discovery Way and Village Parkway. So large, it can even be seen all the way from I-95, its stainless steel surfaces gleam, reflecting sunny blue skies. At night, LED lighting will trace its distinctive edges.

Dedication of JEFREE's "Heart in the Park" sculpture is anticipated to be Valentine's Day 2025.

Our Favorite Recipes

Carol Bailey's Tiramisu

1 Cup cold water

1 1/4 oz. can of fat-free sweetened condensed milk

1 3/4 oz. pkg sugar-free vanilla instant pudding mix

1 8 oz. block 1/3-less-fat cream cheese, softened

1 8 oz. tub frozen reduced-calorie whipped topping, thawed.

1 cup hot water

1/2 cup Kahlua (coffee flavored liqueur)

1 tbsp. instant espresso or 2 tbsp. instant coffee granules.

24 ladyfingers (two 3oz. Packages)

3 tbsp. unsweetened cocoa, divided

- 1. Combine cold water, condensed milk and vanilla pudding in a large bowl; stir well with a whisk. Cover with plastic wrap; chill 30 minutes or until firm.
- 2. Remove plastic wrap, add cream cheese. Beat with a mixer at medium speed until well-blended. Gently fold in whipped topping.
- 3. Combine hot water, Kahlua, and espresso. Split ladyfingers in half lengthwise. Arrange 16 ladyfinger halves, flat sides down, in a trifle bowl or large glass bowl. Drizzle with 1/2 cup Kahlua mixture.
- 4. Spread 1/3 of pudding mixture evenly over lady-fingers, sprinkle with 1 tbsp. cocoa. Repeat layers ending with cocoa. Cover and chill for 8 hours. Makes twelve 2/3 cup servings.





You Can Volunteer At The Aquarium

Looking for an interesting and different volunteer opportunity in St. Lucie County? The Aquarium on Seaway Drive in Ft. Pierce offers unique volunteer positions for those aged 16 and up. No experience is needed, training will be provided, and a background check is required.

One of the jobs for volunteers is **Touch Tank Interpreter.** In this position you will assist visitors, including children, as they view the Touch Tank. For this position, you should be comfortable touching live marine animals like sea urchins, sea cucumbers, and hermit crabs, and sharing information about our Ecosystems. Minimum time commitment is one day a week for at least two months.

Aquarium Guides lead tours for groups of 1-30 attendees, and should be comfortable in speaking to a group, and answering questions about our local marine life. One three -hour shift per week for a minimum of three months is required.



Animal Care and Feeding Specialist are two opportunities for volunteers that require lifting, bending, climbing ladders, and working on your feet for three hours a week for a commitment of 3 months.

Volunteers can also assist with the Photography and digital Media, using a digital video camera to record interesting behavior and activity of the sea creatures, as well as reviewing the library of digital photographs for quality.

Lastly, **Special Projects Volunteers** use their skills in helping staff with electrical, plumbing, and fabrication projects to help develop, design and fabricate display and collection devices.

Birds of Florida

Brown Pelican

Brown Pelicans are year-round residents of Florida. They're well recognized regulars at beaches and especially around boat docks where they are seen hoping for fish scraps from fishermen cleaning their catch dockside.



Pelicans are strong swimmers thanks to their webbed feet. They will fly high over the water watching for schooling fish. Then, with a dramatic plunging dive into the water, they'll scoop their prey with their large pouched beak.

Sometimes they'll fish by swimming in cooperative groups forming a line, flapping their wings on the water to drive fish to the shallows where they can then easily scoop them up. Then they'll drain the water from their bill and swallow the fish whole, head first so its fins can't expand damaging their esophagus on the way down. An adult bird may eat up to 4 pounds of fish per day.

Often you'll see a Seagull sitting on the head of a Pelican. He's hoping to snatch a freshly caught fish. As soon as the Pelican slightly opens its bill to drain the scooped water out, the Seagull will then try to snatch one or two of the fish directly out of the Pelican's pouched beak.

Pelican chicks are defenseless and rely completely on parental care and protection for the first 3 to 4 weeks after hatching. They usually begin to fly at about 13 weeks. Each bird has a dis-



tinct personality. They're generally friendly birds, but experts suggest you don't touch them because of their ferocity when alarmed.

Pelicans can sleep while flying, although it's only in short bursts and typically with only one-half of their brain resting at a time. On land, Pelicans usually sleep on their feet in a standing position with their beak tilted off to the side resting on the ground.

Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day is December 7th and commemorates the Japanese attack on the United States naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii in 1941. More than 2,400 navy personnel and civilians died that day.



President Franklin D. Roosevelt called it "a date which will live in infamy" and declared war on Japan. Japan's allies (Germany and Italy) then declared war against the United States and World War II began. In remembrance, all American flags should be lowered to half staff from sunrise to sunset that day.
