- Reading over 30 new books.



Master Gardener, Certified Florida Master Naturalist, St. Lucie County Hike leader and avid Audubon Birder are a few of the accomplishments Marjorie Flo-

ry has attained in her life so far. Her love for the outdoors, plants, and birds began during her childhood in Little Ferry, NJ. Marj recalls her happy childhood learning about gardening from her father and grandmother. All of nature fascinated her.

Marj took courses at Rutgers and Princeton, and graduated with a Master's Degree in Science Education, with an emphasis on Biology from Trenton State College. During the summers, she waitressed in the Catskills, and also taught swimming on the side. She made a deal with the parents of

her students: she would teach their child to swim during the week they stayed at the resort, and if she was unsuccessful, they didn't have to pay her at week's end. Her many courses in swimming and water safety served her well, and every parent happily paid her.

She enjoyed sports, and played Tennis on a traveling team, and also enjoyed playing Women's Basketball. Marj taught Biology to High School students in Ewing, NJ for 25 years. She also taught Biology at Trenton Junior college.

She married and had three daughters. During that time, she became a Master Gardener through the Rutgers Extension Service, where she volunteered for 2,000 hours and taught classes. She and her family enjoyed many camping trips together.

After retirement, they moved to Arizona, and she became a docent at Tohono Chul Park, in Tuscon. Living in the foothills of the Catalina Mountains, she found a love for hiking and birding. What Is The ACC And What Does It Do?

The Architectural Control Committee (AC a key role in maintaining the aesthetic and structural standards of our community. The ACC is made up of volunteers who live in our community. The Committee reviews all proposed exterior changes to ensure they align with the guidelines established by the Homeowners Association (HOA). Here's how it works:

- 1. **Approval Obligation:** It is the homeowner's responsibility to obtain written approval from the HOA Board for any modifications.
- 2. Application Requirement: Before making any

modifications to your home or property, you must submit an ACC application. The deadline for an application is two weeks prior to each ACC meeting.

- 3. **Access to Applications:** You can find the neces-The Architectural Control Committee (ACC) plays sary application forms on our website, *lathoa.org*
 - 4. **Review Process:** The ACC reviews all proposed changes to determine if they adhere to the written guidelines and community standards as outlined in our HOA documents.
 - 5. **Meetings:** The committee convenes at 10am on the first Wednesday of each month to review applications and make approval recommendations to the Board of Directors.

This process ensures that all changes maintain the community's look and feel, preserving property values. If you're planning any modifications, make sure to get your application in first!

Birds of The Lakes

Mottled Ducks

Florida Mottled ducks are a dabbling type of duck, a sub-species of the Mallard. Dabbling ducks live in shallow water with 40% of their diet consisting of insects, snails, mollusks, crayfish, and small fish. They will feed by picking items off the waters surface or just below it, tipping the tail skyward as they submerge the head and beak below waters surface.

They have mottled dark brown skin and a much paler, buff colored neck and head. They also have a very dark line thru each of their eyes, a bright yellow beak and have short, orange colored legs.



Mottled ducks are one of the most common species of duck found in Florida and are often seen in our lakes. Hawks and eagles are natural predators of Mottled ducks. Look for this species in pairs or small flocks.

They pair up before other species of ducks, generally by November. Mating season begins in January peaking in spring. Females select the nest site, not far from the water generally at the base of a shrub and build a bowl-shaped depression filled with shredded grass beneath dense overhanging vegetation.

Clutch size consists of 8-12 eggs hatching in 25 days with chicks able to leave the nest very soon after hatching.

Our Favorite Recipes

Donna Bousquet's Peach & Raspberry Cobbler

3 cups combined of sliced peaches & raspberries or whatever fresh fruit is on hand.

1 tbs. freshly squeezed lemon juice

1/4 tsp. almond extract

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

1 large egg, beaten

6 tbs. melted margarine

Ice cream or whipped cream for topping

Preheat oven to 375 degrees; grease generously with butter a 10x6 inch baking dish. Sprinkle lemon juice and almond extract over fruit. In large bowl, mix flour, sugar, salt and egg to a shaggy consistency. Scatter topping over fruit. Drizzle the melted margarine evenly over the top. Bake 40-45 minutes until golden brown.

Martin Luther King Day

January 20th is MLK Day in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. the civil rights leader. Legislation was signed by President Reagan in 1983 declaring his birthday a national holiday.

Some of his notable acts included: heading the 381 day protest against segregation in 1955, which led to the Supreme Court ruling segregation unconstitutional in 1956; organizing the March on Washington in 1963



where he gave his famous "I Have A Dream" speech to 25,000 protestors, which led to the Civil Rights Act of 1964. He then became the youngest person to receive the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964.

In 1965, he headed the Selma to Montgomery March, the success of which resulted in the Voting Rights Act of 1965.
